OUR BEGINNING . . .

The Glenpool church of Christ held its first service at 2:00 p.m. on April 2, 1982, in the Glenpool Community Center located at 94 West 145th Street in Glenpool, Oklahoma. A group of Christians from the 49th and Tacoma congregation in Tulsa met with the minister and his wife, Don and Frances Pippin, and the John Davis Family—John, Glenda, Michael, age 5; Amy, age 3; and Ryan, age 5 months.

Don had graduated in February from the Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock, Texas. Although Don and Frances had been living and working in Muskogee, the Tulsa area was home and they desired to work in a congregation in or near the Tulsa area. They were being supported by the Westside church in Muskogee and the 49th and Tacoma church. (As time went on other area churches gave support to the young church.)

The Pippins and elders from 49th and Tacoma began a search to locate a place where they thought a new congregation was needed. They explored areas in Prue and Glenpool. On March 28, 1982, they made the final decision and the Glenpool church of Christ was planted.

Because afternoon services were difficult for the young children, the church began assembling about a month later on Sunday mornings at the home of the Pippins on Birch Street.

Members from 49th and Tacoma continued to work closely with the new church. There were several door-knocking efforts made the first few years to inform the neighborhood about the new congregation and to identify and invite Christians living in or near town.

Don began to pick up Virginia Tiger and her three daughters: Lori, 8; Shelly, 6; and Angie, 2½. Her husband, Monte, had to work on Sundays. They, with Debbie Whitchurch and her children, Eddie, Jr., 9; Christy, 7; and Keri, 5; Renee Dunham and daughter, Stephanie; Richard Foster and children, Robert and Lanita; and George and Rosalie O'Neal, Mike and Julie, composed the church for about the first year.

Don taught the adults and teens and Debbie Whitchurch taught the children as they sat on the bed. Monte Tiger was the first convert and was baptized in the fall.

In 1983, the church began meeting regularly at the Community Center again. Other members who gradually came were Roy and Barbara Girod; Bruce and Lilia Rothell with Tammy, 3; and Tiffany, 6 months; Bob and Sherry Scott, Michelle, Kathy, Kimberly, and Robert; Carolyn McGuire and Tina; June Parkhurst; William Pruss; Ken and Jane Dykes; William Lanza; David and Sharon Bryan and Jonathan; Tim and Shirley Johns; and in 1987, Dan and Edna Jones.

The first baby born was Kyle Johns on June 5, 1984. Next came Kelsey Dykes on June 17, 1984. Jennifer Dunham arrived on December 21, 1985; April Rothell on April 29, 1986; and Kendal Dykes on May 5, 1987. Matthew Howith was born January 5, 1987.


Debbie started the first baby class and was assisted by Jane Dykes. Other classes were being held in different areas of the large meeting room. Other teachers were Virginia Tiger, Sharon Bryan, Frances Pippin, and Sherry Scott. "Unique experiences," remembers Debbie.

To our knowledge, Deborah Whitchurch has never had a break from teaching in all these 26 years!

Some of the early members do not remember how they first learned of the new church. The Tigers heard from some of the Christians who were going door to door. The O'Neals heard when George and Don became acquainted at an Optimists Club Meeting. (George was a song leader, but he and his family left during the first year and Don often had to lead in every part of the worship services.)

Lilia Rothell recalls how Barbara Girod encouraged her family to come by telling her, "We need a man!" Of course, Lilia and the girls were a welcome addition, too. It was not unusual for the members to have to clean up the meeting room following the previous weekend activities before they could set the chairs, communion, and class areas in order.

They way Dan and Edna Jones heard about the church was perhaps one of the most unusual. They had moved to Glenpool when Dan retired from Wal-Mart in Bentonville, Arkansas. They had inquired at the Chamber of Commerce and were told there was no church of Christ. A woman with the "Welcome Wagon" called on them. She was a member of another religious group and a neighbor of Barbara Girod. She assured them the church of Christ did indeed exist here!



THE FIRST PERMANENT BUILDING...

In preparation for a permanent building in which the church could meet, a used prefabricated building, size 24 x 48 feet, was purchased from another religious group in 1985 and the church began making payments on it.

We have a very limited number of early bulletins, but on the five-year anniversary of the Glenpool church, Brother Pippin made this observation in the Family Newsletter, Vol. 1, No. 2, April 5, 1987:

It hardly seems possible! Last month (March) marks the end of five years of our work here in Glenpool, together.

Looking back, I think of the many good times we have shared together and also some disappointing times. Many of you met with us when we were meeting in our home, on Birch St. Some of you have become Christians in the last five years. Some of you have learned to teach people about Jesus. Many have grown in their faith and service to the Lord. There have been some very close friendships developed within the church here in the past five years. Personally, I want all of you to know that I love and appreciate every one of you, for the love and encouragement you have given me with your kind words and actions.

Looking ahead, I believe we will continue to grow in our faith and love as God's people. I believe each of us will learn better how to serve God together, so that we can cause His Kingdom to grow. I believe there are a lot of people that are lost today that will be saved in the future because of the church being here.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."


That year the membership list named 21 families. June Parkhurst, Lisa Allen, Tammy Marrs and Carolyn McGuire had been baptized by Don at the 49th and Tacoma building. Carolyn was a co-worker of Frances Pippin and Lisa and Tammy are Carolyn's daughters.

The search began for property on which to place the building. Three acres of land at 130th and South Elwood were purchased from John Miller after the City of Glenpool approved the site for a church. The building was moved and the ground breaking was held on October 30, 1987. The ground was frozen so hard that the men were unable to scoop even a shovel full of dirt.

Don Pippin, Bruce Rothell, Roy Girod, Donny Pippin, and Ken Dykes put in many, many hours to make it all happen. Ken's father donated the central air conditioning. In 1988 the church family finally had a home.

A lectureship was held in the fall of 1988 and the speakers were Tom Bright, Hershel Dyer, Sidney Ellis and Francis Whiteman.

Christy and Eddie Whitchurch were baptized by Ken Dykes in 1989. They went to the Broken Arrow church for the baptisms because their grandparents lived there.



First Permanent Facility

THE 1990's...

This would be a historic decade for the Glenpool church!

Eddie Whitchurch, Jr. graduated in 1990.

There were numerous excellent articles in the bulletins during this time written by Don Pippin, Bill Hamrick, Bob DeLay and Bruce Rothell. They contained teachings on Christ, unity, and encouragement. Some of the titles were "True Happiness," "Friends," "The Prosperous Soul," and "No Excuses for Excuses." A note about the Great Sequoia trees illustrated how Christians can be. These trees do not have deep roots, but they grow in groves and their shallow roots intertwine, supporting and holding each other up.

Part of an article by Bruce in the Glenpool church of Christ Newsletter, Vol. 11, No. 4, on May 5, 1991, observed this:

Recently our congregation has experienced a number of heartaches and sorrows. Some have lost a dear friend, others have or have had relatives seriously ill in hospitals. The recent hurts have grieved us all, for when one of us hurts, we all hurt. We are one big family with a caring, compassionate love for one another. And we can be thankful for that love; thankful for our friendship, thankful for the closeness that we share. We can be thankful for our children and their health, remembering the courageous example of the Lastingers. (A neighbor family whose child had a genetic order disease which meant she would likely only get worse and never better.) And there are surely many other things we can be thankful for; so many we can't possibly count them all. And yet, if we had very little to be thankful for, we would still have more than the early Christians who were content just knowing Christ and with the assurance that THEY WOULD SEE THE KING SOMEDAY.

How fitting for the present church family here in Glenpool!

A tent meeting was held in 1991. The tent was set up where the present church building is located. The 29th and Yale church in Tulsa helped knock on doors and Bill Thrasher and Mike Schroeder were the speakers. One night a heavy rain forced those in attendance to crowd into the small church building.

"THE HAMRICKS ARE HERE!!" was the announcement in the February 2, 1992, weekly bulletin, "Keeping in Touch." This was a major milestone!

Little Kassidy Dykes was born on February 17 and Lorie Tiger, Shellie Hamrick and Kathy Scott graduated from high school that year.

The present auditorium was constructed in two phases. The contractor for the first phase, Brewer Construction, did the foundation work, framework, and the outside walls. A storm with heavy winds came through and twisted the frame rendering it useless and they had to start over. Brother Brewer was a member of the Choteau church of Christ.

Brother James Hayes, a metal building contractor, acted as superintendent for the work that followed. Ken Dykes, Bob DeLay, Bruce Rothell and others, which included several of the ladies, spent many, many hours hanging sheetrock, taping, mudding, painting, and wallpapering to finish the new building. Dan Jones and granddaughter, Deena Howith, put down the baseboards. Debbie Whitchurch's father laid the carpet, barely getting it done before move in day. The first service was in November. Dan and Edna Jones donated 100 new hymn books and Bob and Kathy DeLay furnished the furniture for the foyer.

Open House was held on December 6, 1992! The new baptistry had already been used. Stacy and Amanda Pippin, Robert and Kimberly Scott had become new Christians when they were baptized by Don Pippin on November 29.

In 1993 membership increased with at least five additional families. Dan and Edna Jones were able to return because she had been wheelchair bound and the first building was not wheelchair assessable, they had been worshipping somewhere else for a while.

Then it was 1994.

- The preacher's salary was \$450.00 per week.
- Bob DeLay and Bill Hamrick became elders.
- The deacons were Jesse Byers, Ken Dykes and Bruce Rothell.
- Those leading singing were Ken Dykes and Don Pippin.
- Attendance numbers were increasing.
- Two additional deacons were added—Sonny Pulliam and Michael Bean.
- Jesse and Becky Byers began working with the youth to organize and participate in various activities.
- Already plans were taking shape for expansion.
- In July Doug and Fern Boyle came and endeared themselves to this church family. They worked with the youth, Doug led singing and Fern worked in the office. Fern's words in a recent telephone conversation were, "We had a blast working with the youth group!"
- The second phase began with the expansion of the present auditorium. James Hayes and his partner did the construction and contracted for the remainder of the work. It was finished in 1996. Dan and Edna donated the 100 additional hymn books.

Ken Factor became Minister of Education in 1996. He had become acquainted with the congregation when he helped get ready for the Tent Meeting. The contribution for the building fund had reached \$11,000.00. (There was a time when the contribution was running above budget and so it was increased.)

There came a sad and shocking announcement in July, 1996. Bro. Bob DeLay had died unexpectedly in the hospital following surgery. He had served over three years as an elder, and he and his wife, Kathy, had been a huge asset to the church during that time. Since Bill Hamrick could not serve alone, there were no elders for a very short period, and then Louis McLaughlin and Bill were appointed.

Keri Whitchurch graduated from high school and was baptized by Charlie Kymes. Two weddings occurred: Lexann DeLay and David Leonard were married early in the year and Lorie Tiger and Thomas Thompson married on June 22, 1996.


By 1997 the average worship attendance had reached 87. There were 40 families listed in the church directory. (That list is in a separate section at the end of this history.)

On November 23, Julia Factor was born.

And by 1998:

- Doug and Fern Boyle had their first child, Amanda
- Jesse Byers had stepped down from serving as a deacon and was appointed an elder
- Jared and Joel pence graduated from high school
- Adam and Angie (Tiger) DeGraffenreid were married on October 4

THE 2000's . . .

The year 2000 saw a decrease in attendance and presented the church with a big challenge. The idea of a full-time evangelist was first discussed in June. In November Jim and Barbara Pinkston moved here and began full-time local work. Both had grown up in Sapulpa and graduated from high school there. They married on September 13, 1963. Brother Sydney Ellis taught them the truth. They both attended the Owasso School of Biblical Studies and Jim graduated in 1986. He also began prison ministry work that year. Barbara continued to work full-time as needed and she, too, graduated in 1994. They had sold their business in Sapulpa in 1992. They labored with the church at Ramona for nine years, from November 1991 until they began their work here.

Jacob Anderson was born on March 15. (Chris and Sara were away from the Glenpool church for a while.) Emily Thompson arrived on March 16. Little Andrew Boyle was born late in the year and the Boyles left in 2001.

Lonnie and Donna White and their family came and Lonnie became a Christian in February. Nick was baptized and also Kyle and Troy (Donna's sons) were baptized in May. The average for Sunday morning worship had come back up to 85.

Several new families (most of which are still here) were welcomed into the fellowship during 2003.

- There began to be a need for more classrooms and auditorium space.
- There were 9 baptisms and 10 restorations.
- Thirteen placed memberships.
- A college age class was begun.
- The weekly contribution was \$2,045.14—up from \$1,815.80 the previous year.
- Average worship attendance was 92 which was up from 77 in 2002.
- There was a 20 year Homecoming and a Fall Lectureship.
- Rob Kress, Jerry Powers, Randy Brown, and Jerry O'Shields were new deacons.
- Jerry and Mary Powers worked with the youth group for several years during the mid 2000's.
- Jerry Powers submitted the first preliminary drawings for building expansion in November. The original plan was to convert the current auditorium to a fellowship room and expand into a new auditorium to the east.
- In February 2004 the building fund began with \$1,000.
- Hershel Dyer held the spring meeting.
- Riley McCafferty had arrived on February 19 and Josiah Anderson was born on July 6.
- Three new deacons were installed on May 23: Jeff Bullinger, Chris McCoy, and Carl Burris which brought the total to eight.
- Six seniors graduated.
- The worship attendance average reached 115!!!

- The following year the Kress family moved to Venezuela.
- Carl Burris became one of the elders.
- In November the building fund reached \$63,286.13!!!
- New Christians in 2006 were Keith White and Renee Whitchurch. Also, Valerie and Michael Brown felt the need to be immersed again.
- Stafford North held a gospel meeting in April. The theme was "Like a Thief in the Night—What You Should Know About the Last Days."
- There were also two weddings in April: Stephanie Byers and Nick White and Stephanie Powers and Ryan Pulliam.
- By early 2007 members had contributed over \$88,000 into the building fund. It was time for the old annex to come down after serving well for 20 years as the auditorium, classrooms and fellowship hall.

In January of 2007 the building size was decided and an architect was hired. The members began working to tear down and haul away the old building and clearing the grounds. Building plans were submitted to the City of Glenpool in mid-May for approval.

The first of July plans were approved and put out to bid. Bids were taken by three contractors. Vista Construction was the low bidder and was awarded the contract at the end of July. There were delays in the shipment of steel, but finally in September the work began on the utilities and foundation. There was another delay in shipment, but the bulletin on October 28, 2007, stated the progress went from "cement slab to framework and outside walls in one week."

Bro. Jesse Byers resigned as elder due to health problems and Randy Brown and Jim Pinkston were installed as additional elders to serve with Carl Burris and Bill Hamrick. Deacons now were Jeff Bullinger, Johnny Riggs, and Bruce Rothell.

The list of high school and college graduates was impressive that year. Andrew Morgan graduated from Bixby High School. Doug and Loretta Anderson completed the 32-hour program at the Owasso School of Biblical Studies, Daniel Byers, Rebecca Byers, and Nicholas and Stephanie (White) Byers graduated from Northeastern State University in Tahlequah, and April Rothell graduated from Oklahoma State University. They all made us proud! We were glad to share in celebrating their accomplishments.

Lydia Jones was born on May 22 and Paden McCafferty on September 12. More new families came and Matthew Caldwell was baptized into Christ.

An anonymous contributor gave a very sizeable sum also for the building fund to apply toward future expansion needs. The climax of the new addition came in mid-January 2008 when all the inside work was completed!

The annual Valentine's Day fellowship was held as we enjoyed this wonderful new facility. It will be a great blessing and a very useful tool for classes, special fellowship events, and outreach efforts.

We have two more new Christians in our family: Mike and Kimber Perry. With others who have come and placed themselves under the oversight of the elders, we now have 67 families in the current 2008 church directory.

ANOTHER LOOK BACK...

... the Youth

All through the years Bible Classes have been provided for the young children and older youth group. Teachers have attended teacher training workshops and seminars. Warren and Carolyn Wilcox conducted one here in Glenpool The early church family helped when there was no official youth minister. There have been youth devotionals, youth rallies (Allan Lay was one speaker), youth and parents picnics and games, trips to Frontier City, the zoo, and Branson, and floating on the Illinois River. The young people had a lock-in with the Turley Children's Home (now Hope Harbor) and prepared dinner for a needy family. Several of the youth have traveled on mission trips.

Most of our teens and young adults were baptized in this church. The young men are encouraged to read the scriptures, serve at the Lord's table and lead public prayers. The young women have taught in VBS classes. We have seen them graduate from high school and some from college. They have made this church family proud.

From 2003-2007 some of our youth have gone with other NSU Christians on various mission trips. These included trips to Gold Beach, Oregon; Orlando, Florida; New York City (the church on Long Island); and San Francisco, California. Some also helped with clean-up in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina.

... Fellowship

One reason for all the love this church family has for one another is the fact that we also spend time together away from Bible classes and worship. Fellowship times have included care groups, regular potluck dinners, Valentine's Day Banquets, Fall and Holiday parties, men's breakfasts, fishing trips, fish fries, ladies' day, and ladies' night out.

... Members Serving

Members have consistently volunteered to clean the building, lock the doors after services, bake communion bread, prepare the communion, stock the pantry, keep the grounds, make calls, and send cards of encouragement, prepare meals for the needy and bereaved, and give financial assistance. The ladies had showers to furnish needed items for the nursery and kitchen. All these works increased the bond of love.

... Outreach

Through the years outreach efforts have included clothing and school supplies give aways, holiday food baskets, support for hurricane and tornado victims, care packages to the hospital, and devotionals at the Glenpool Health Care Center. Annually there is the Change Can Campaign and the Phone Campaign for Hope Harbor Children's Home and Academy at Claremore. The church building has been used for a polling place during elections.

... Evangelism

In efforts to evangelize as Jesus commanded, the church has mailed the *House to House* brochures quarterly to residents in the area, and helped support a preacher student at the Bear Valley School of Preaching in Denver. We also support Dave Miller with Apologetics Press, the Spanish ministry, an orphanage in Haiti, Redmen for Christ at Northeastern State University in Tahlequah, and have helped send several youth on mission trips.

A very vital part of the evangelistic efforts has been the prison ministry work. The Pinkstons have been involved in the prison ministry since 1986. Jim continues to go to the prisons to teach classes. He has been to the Jess Dunn Correctional Center in Taft; John Lilley Correctional Center at Boley; MacAlford Correctional Center in Stringtown, and Dick Conners Correctional Center in Hominy. Bob Staley and Jerry O'Shields taught at the Jess Dunn Correctional Center in Taft and at John Lilly from 1992 until 2007. Bill Hamrick visited prisons and taught part-time for over 10 years. On December 20, 2006, he began teaching regularly with Jim Pinkston at Conners. He also goes to David L. Moss Correctional Center in Tulsa and Creek and Rogers County Jails.

Bible correspondence courses and New Life Behavior courses are sent to women at the Eddie Warrior Correctional Center at Taft. Several women in the Wednesday morning Bible class grade the papers from the prison classes and the Bible correspondence courses. These women are: Joe Andrews, Leola Harmon, Mel Staley, Lenora Hamrick, Jean Ishmael, Sherri Carr, and Rosalie O'Neal.


A great many prisoners have become Christians through the years and volunteers from eight different congregations help conduct worship services at some of the prisons. Those in the prison ministry report there will be 88 students graduating from 5 classes taught on Thursdays at the Dick Conner Correctional Center in Hominy. Twenty-three have been baptized this year.

Lilia and I get a very stiff reminder twice a week on how lucky we are; how much the Lord has blessed us. Twice a week, Lilia takes care of Kirby Lastinger, who I'm sure many of you have heard about. Kirby is the little girl with a genetic disorder disease. There is no cure for her disease and most children with her disease don't live past 9 years. Each time we see Kirby, we have to be extremely thankful that all our children are healthy. To have a child who is steadily getting worse and who in all likelihood will never get better; well, that's a pain, a heartache that you wish no one had to endure. Knowing your child is never going to run and play, nor know the laughter that other children do, well...that's got to be the worst pain of all.

Yet the Lastingers bravely endure. Asking for no pity, only understanding. They organize and participate in many fundraisers for children like Kirby; and each July, they organize a Chili-Cookoff to raise funds for research of the disease. Also, they wish the best for everyone else's children. I remember Shirley Lastinger coming by to see April after Lilia gave birth to April. How happy she was

for us, yet one could see the tears in her eyes as she held April.

But the Lastinger's story is not without happiness. The Lord has rewarded their courage. They now have a very healthy three year old son named Chance, who runs, plays and laughs like other children. I remember how the whole neighborhood rejoiced when we heard the news that Shirley was pregnant and even more so when Chance was born. And now there is even more to rejoice about, because Shirley is carrying another child.

Recently our congregation has experienced a number of heartaches and sorrows. Some have lost a dear friend, others have or have had relatives seriously ill in hospitals. The recent hurts have grieved us all, for when one of us hurts, we all hurt. We are one big family with a caring, compassionate love for

one another.

And we can be thankful for that love; thankful for our friendship, thankful for the closeness that we share. We can be thankful for our children and their health, remembering the courageous example of

the Lastingers.

And there are surely many other things we can be thankful for; so many we can't possibly count them all. And yet, if we had very little to be thankful for, we would still have more than the early Christians who were content just knowing Christ and with the assurance that THEY WOULD SEE THE KING SOMEDAY.

NOTES FROM THE PREACHER...

KNOWING CHRIST OR KNOWING ABOUT CHRIST

There was a young lady who grew up in a Christian home, attended services regularly from infancy and graduated from a Christian University. She remained active in the church until her college graduation but within two years she was attending services only on visits home and she had begun to drink socially and engage in other unchristian actions. When she was questioned as to the reasons for her change, her reply was, "I realized at last that I only knew about Christ, but I never really knew Him".

It is essential that we know about Christ and Christianity. We need certain facts (truth) to build our faith upon, (1 Cor. 15:1-4). A knowledge of the word is absolutely necessary, (John 17:17; John 8:32).

However, there is a difference in accepting principles to be true and truly living by these principles. We may learn facts but never integrate them into our philosophy of life.

When the real pressures and temptations of life must be faced, apart from the direct influence of loved ones, the one without a personal, real and living faith will usually give over to Satan. We have a great challenge to help out young people to develop a personal relationship with God and Christ. This includes our example before them when we are faced with trials and temptations. It requires us to allow them to question and probe facts about the bible and Christianity. The truth will always stand up in the light of honest investigation.

May we encourage our children to make God as personal as any friend or playmate, yet teach them a proper reverence for the Creator. They need to know Christ in addition to knowing about Him.

NOTES FROM THE PREACHER...

"Avoiding Extremes"

We live in an age of excesses and we are presented

with the constant challenge to not be overcome.

Our age is characterized by a lack of accountability for human behavior and a broad tolerance for differing views. We see some of the consequences of this philosophy in the alarming increase of violence, a lack of respect for human life and the open endorsement of "alternative" lifestyles. It seems that the only people not to be tolerated are Bible believers.

We are seeing, even in the Lord's church, some who seem determined to reshape the church to "fit" our modern society. There have been serious efforts to abandon primitive Christianity in favor of a church more tolerant of modern denominationalism. Advocates of change seem tolerant of everyone but their brethren who

choose to remain in the "Old Paths."

We believe there is a real danger in overreacting to our pagan\secular society or even to brethren bent on change. In our efforts to uphold the truth, may we take care not to add to the word of God, (Rev. 22:18). We must carefully distinguish between custom and opinion and matters of doctrine. When we begin to bind our opinions as authority from God, we have also erred.

Vigilance is essential, but we must avoid suspicious attitudes about everyone who may not agree with us in every point. It is so important that we keep a sense of balance between the excesses. Others are more likely to take our warnings seriously when we avoid

the extremes.

NOTES FROM THE PREACHER...

"You Are Still Carnal"

Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 3:3, "For you are still carnal. For where there are envy, strife, and divisions among you, are you not carnal and behaving like mere men?"

The word carnal has a wide scope of meaning. It includes sexual and sensual sins but is also used to include tempers and dispositions expressing themselves in strife and dissensions. In Romans 7:14, it is used to distinguish between the physical and spiritual nature.

Paul informed the Corinthians that he could not speak to them as though they were spiritual since they were led by the impulse of the flesh, (1 Cor. 3:1). He also points to the need they had to be given milk rather than food suitable for mature Christians. Milk was best suited to the digestive system of the weak and helpless. Although a sufficient time had elapsed for them to be eating spiritually mature food, their failure to deny the flesh indicated their continued need for the food appropriate only for infants.

How were they carnal? Verses 3 and 4 of 1 Corinthians 3 lists envy, strife and divisions as the reasons for this classification. In Galatians 5:19-21, Paul lists the works of the flesh in more detail. Where these thing exist, the flesh rules!

We see the same problems in the 20th Century church. We still must fight against jealousy, envy, gossip, parties and factions. The devil wants to disturb the peace of the church and even lead the strong back to carnal practices. We just can't be careful enough when it comes to this issue. We all need to regularly examine self and always strive for the higher ground of spirituality.
