A Serious Conversation about Lent

Why in the world would a preacher of the churches of Christ even concern himself about this topic that is wholly associated with Catholicism? I'll tell you why. For the last two years when the Lenten season in the liturgical calendar of Catholicism has rolled around, I've encountered several articles and posts on social media from those inside and outside the church who observe this season. However, many of my other brethren have always had their snarky comments to post as well: "I'm giving up Lent for Lent," or "I don't have any Lent in my pocket, so what's the fuss!?" Now, don't get me wrong, I'm a prince of all things snarky, so I'm not criticizing.

Before I go on with this conversation, let me make a few things clear so you or anyone else won't misconstrue what I mean: (1) There is no word "Lent" in all of the Bible. (2) There is no command to observe any season in the Bible for religious purposes, let alone that of Lent. (3) There is no example of the church observing any similar season in the Bible. As far as I see it, these are the facts.

Moving on from that, I was curious about this season of Lent, so I considered two sources – my Christian wife who was reared Roman Catholic, and the Encyclopedia of Early Christianity (2d. ed.). My dear wife, who is of Italian descent, converted to Christianity when she was seventeen. She was the first person I ever studied with and baptized, but she was reared Roman Catholic. Her maternal grandparents were charter members of St. Ignatius Catholic parish in Antioch, TN. Her parents and grandparents were wed at The Cathedral on Broadway where the bishop resides. She grew up going to Catholic school from kindergarten all the way through middle school. I asked her what she could tell me about Lent, and she said that it was a time, for her at least, when you couldn't eat meat on Fridays and had to give up something. She said that the Church did a poor job educating young Catholics as to why they observed Lent, and to her it was always an inconvenience.

When reading about it, Lent was a forty-day fast period before Easter. It used to be that during these days, people considering conversion to Christianity would undergo a forty-day period of religious instruction that culminated with their baptism on Easter Sunday – the day that was regarded as "the feast of feasts" because of Christ's having arisen from the dead on that day. The word "Lent" itself is Anglo-Saxon and means "spring."

Not only did Jesus fast while He was tempted, but the disciples fasted often, so the exact duration of fasting in the earliest history of this religious observance was not uniform. Actually, the fasting period in the earliest associations with Lent was

two days, or forty hours. Since Jesus' flesh was what was crucified, this became the reason for abstaining from meat during this season – especially on Friday, since that was the actual day that Christ was crucified.

Now, considering all of this, I'm not in the least bit advocating that we should observe Lent. However, I would want for us to think about not merely fasting, but spiritual disciplines as a whole. There are several spiritual disciplines that we could practice as the church and as individuals. Of course, bear in mind that if the Scriptures do not command it in certain terms, then we do it only out of devotion to Christ and have no right to bind on another what God hasn't already bound through the Sacred Scriptures. I've heard of congregations of the Lord's Church having prayer meetings, or a twenty-four hour Gospel meeting. Some at the end of the year have twenty-four hour readings of the Bible where people take turns reading portions of the Scriptures. Of course, included in these spiritual disciplines is not only prayer and Scripture reading, but fasting. Fasting from food, if one's health will allow, as a discipline to dedicate one's self to God for a purpose (i.e. divine event such as worship, repentance, or sorrow) is certainly seen in the Scriptures, but if we aren't yet disciplined enough to fast from meals, surely some of us could stand to fast from social media, television, or something else that occupies our time to the neglect of God.


Here's my only point for bringing this up: we celebrate the temporal holidays of the 4th of July, Mother's and Father's Day, New Year's Eve and the like which are fashioned by the American Civic religious ethos. Should not our calendars be more Gospel shaped than secular shaped? If we are truly citizens of heaven (Phil. 3.20), should not the things of heaven occupy us a great deal more than they do? Instead of viewing Lent as a "mere tradition" and an "empty ritual," perhaps we can learn from it. According to my wife, the majority of people she knew shared her views about Lent when she was a girl. The people I've spoken with who observe it do so out of sincere devotion to God from what I can tell. If there's anything we can learn, can it not be that we should be more spiritually disciplined? I must confess my own hypocrisy, because I'm poorly spiritually disciplined in my own eyes. I can binge watch Netflix like it's going out of style.

I can, however, admire the truth that Lent represents: depriving my flesh of its wants to focus more on God. If Paul could learn from Greek poets and quote them in the Holy Bible, I can learn from my other religious neighbors too what I may neglect as a Christian. I'm not arguing for a Lenten observance. I'm only suggesting that we take stock of ourselves and if we practice any spiritual devotions to God. Jesus has told us how we may do so to the pleasure of our Father (Matt. 6.1-18).
